Carolyn Gove Bennett, 85, of Evansville, Indiana, died Friday, January 24, 2020.

Carolyn was born in Worcester, Massachusetts, and grew up in the nearby town of Holden. She graduated as valedictorian from Holden High School, class of 1952. She went on to earn her bachelor's degree in physics from Bates College in Lewiston, Maine. In 1954, while working at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute, she met the love of her life, Paul Bennett. They married and moved to Pennsylvania. After starting a family, she returned to school, entering the then new field of computer science at Penn State University. Her first computing job was supporting researchers from around the world at the Agricultural Data Processing Lab at Penn State. After the family moved to Evansville, Carolyn applied her skills as computer programmer and systems analyst at Old National Bank and American

General Finance. Church life was important for her at Bethlehem UCC and she believed in helping others. At the end of the Vietnam War, she opened her home to Vietnamese refugees. After hurricane Katrina, she went with a crew to build houses for those that had lost everything. Carolyn volunteered as a Court Appointed Special Advocate for neglected or abused children, an AARP Tax Aide, and at the United Caring Shelter. As president of the Evansville Audubon Society, she was instrumental in establishing the Bluegrass Fish & Wildlife Area.

Carolyn was preceded in death by her husband of 56 years, Paul Bennett. She was a great lady and will be sorely missed.

Following the Program the Business Meeting was called to order at 7:20 PM by President Sue Vernier.

Minutes: President Vernier asked if there were any additions or corrections to the minutes as emailed; being none, the minutes were accepted as emailed.

Treasurer's Report: The following balances were reported and accepted.

Trump Administration Moves to Weaken Migratory Bird Safeguards

Now at risk is the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, one of our most important wildlife conservation laws. The Trump administration's proposed rule would codify a controversial legal opinion issued by the Department of Interior declaring the MBTA does not prohibit unintentional killing of migratory birds. Passed by Congress in 1918, the MBTA is one of the oldest wildlife conservation laws. Both Republican and Democratic administrations have applied the act to prohibit, without a permit, both intentional and unintentional killing of covered species. This interpretation has created standards that require oil producers to put nets over crude oil waste pits, as well as better siting and operation of wind turbines. If these proposed changes are finalized, companies will no longer face legal consequences or have incentive to use best management practices to avoid activities that are deadly to migratory birds. And that's true for small construction sites and major oil operations alike. Consider the consequences. When a million birds died in the wake of Deepwater Horizon, BP had to pay \$100 million in fines because of the MBTA. But under the weakened law, they wouldn't pay a dime. They could simply claim those deaths were accidental.

Audubon has mobilized to defend the MBTA and is challenging the administration in court, and just helped introduce legislation in Congress that reaffirms the law—H.R. 5552 Migratory Bird Protection Act. Contact your congressman and ask for his support.

2019 Vanderburgh Christmas Bird Count

The Christmas Bird Count was completed again this year, thanks going out to 21 field counters and 4 feeder counters. The weather cooperated and we had a good count. We were curious to see if there would be any effect on numbers due to climate change. A comparison between the last two years is shown in the table below. Actually, this year's numbers are up overall compared to last year, especially in the counts for Snow Geese and Red Wing Blackbirds. Weather conditions vary from year to year, which probably accounts for the differences between the two years. The makeup of the teams was nearly identical for the two years. So, thankfully, we did not see any alarming trends yet due to climate change or any other effects.
