Meet the Celebrities of Southern Indiana

Whooping Cranes once extirpated from the Midwest and on the brink of extinction, are a treasured visitor of Indiana every winter. In the 1940s, only a small population of around 20 Whooping Cranes remained in the western United States. In 2001, efforts to save Whooping Cranes led to the establishment of the Eastern Migratory Population, a completely reintroduced population that stretches through much of the Midwest and southern United States. In the summer, Whooping Cranes within the Eastern Migratory Population will breed in Wisconsin, and in the late fall, they will migrate to their wintering locations in western Indiana and northern Alabama. The International Crane Foundation, a non-profit dedicated to conserving cranes worldwide, is continuing to support the growth of this population by releasing Whooping Crane fledglings raised in captivity through costume and parent-rearing techniques and supporting the hatching of chicks in the wild. As a result of these efforts, nearly 80 birds make up this population and offer a spectacular opportunity to view one of the rarest crane species worldwide throughout the eastern United States and right here in Indiana.

In southern Indiana, we are lucky to have a large annual wintering population of around 15-20 Whooping Cranes at Goose Pond Fish and Wildlife Area in Greene County. Another 4 Whooping Cranes have been wintering in the Gibson County area.

A regular wintering crane to keep a lookout for is W4-22, a chick who recently hatched in the wild. With the majority of cranes in the Eastern Migratory Population raised in captivity, this is an exciting new addition to the flock! This season W4-22 can be found around Goose Pond Fish and Wildlife Area spending time with her parents, wild hatched W1-19 and costume reared 1-17. W4-22 looks distinct from other Whooping Cranes because she has a cinnamon-colored head and armpits. By the time W4-22 makes it back to Wisconsin in the early spring, she will have white plumage and blend in with the other adult Whooping Cranes!



At the International Crane Foundation, we rely heavily on citizen scientists reporting their sightings of Whooping Cranes. Information on their locations assists in our understanding of habitat use, migratory patterns, survival, breeding pairs, and more. Most Whooping Cranes within the Eastern Migratory Population are banded with black, red, white, and green bands on one or both legs. As you are watching for Whooping Cranes around southern Indiana, please report any sightings to bandedcranes.org and remember these crane safe behaviors.

- Give Whooping Cranes their space and stay 200 yards away from cranes at all times.
- Understand their behaviors head up and wings back mean take a step back!
- Respect private property and only park in designated areas to view Whooping Cranes.
- Report Whooping Crane harassment, disturbance, or poaching to 1-800-TIP-IDNR.

Howell Wetlands Birding Hike


