Excerpts From Evansville Audubon's Chapter Report to National Audubon

Many of our membership may be unaware that chapters of National Audubon must file annual reports. The report is quite detailed and covers nearly a dozen categories. It may surprise you what our small chapter has managed to accomplish with just a handful of unpaid volunteers!! Below are just a few of our accomplishments from the report:

<u>Partners</u> – Our chapter collaborates with organizations and individuals as part of our education and conservation work, including community engagement and policy advocacy. The list ranges from public agencies (Hovey Lake FWA, Patoka River NWR, JJ Audubon S. P., Mesker Park Zoo & Botanic Gardens, Tekoppel Elementary School); private community engagement and science partners (Wesselman Woods, Patchwork Central, Sycamore Land Trust, Indiana Audubon Society); and private individuals (BSA Eagle Scout and Susan Fowler, storytelling artist and scientist).

National Audubon's Gregoriah Hartman, Director, Network Action & Leadership Development, was impressed enough by our chapter report to write: "I just read through your report and WELL DONE! It looks great. I am truly floored by the sheer number of partnerships your chapter maintains – almost 20! That's incredible. You all are clearly keystones in your community."

<u>Activities</u> — Our myriad activities ranged from programs, board meetings, field trips, Christmas Bird Counts, Jr. Birders, outreach events (Mesker Zoo Earth Day celebration), social event (annual potluck), education and conservation grants, advocacy, Ohio Valley Birding Festival, and birding classes (Families of a Feather — Wesselman Woods).

Goals and Priorities – Last year we started our "Events Committee" with the goal to provide outreach to the public at area events. Our display at Mesker Zoo's 'Party for the Planet' Earth Day celebration featured birdy games for kids and QR codes on displays to reduce use of disposable items. This year we plan to be at Wesselman Woods Earth Day event. Our website was overhauled to give it a fresh appearance and hopefully attract potential new members. One of this year's goals is to successfully fill all open positions for officers, directors and committee chairs in order to continue these important activities that our membership expects!


